== Biography == 8f3784307d Abraham Hyacinthe Anquetil was born in Paris on 7 December 1731 as the fourth of seven children of Pierre Anquetil, a spice importer. As was the custom of the time, the name of one of his father's estates, "Duperron", was added to his name to distinguish him from his brothers. Anquetil-Duperron initially distinguished himself in the study of theology at Paris and Utrecht with the intention of becoming a priest like his elder brother Louis-Pierre Anquetil. In the course of his studies, however, he acquired such an interest in Latin, Hebrew, and Greek that he chose to devote himself entirely to philology and classical studies and discontinued his clerical training. He travelled to Amersfoort near Utrecht to study oriental languages, especially... 8f3784307d Michel Henry was born in Haiphong, French Indochina (now Vietnam), and he lived in French Indochina until he was seven years old. Following the death of his father, who was an officer in the French Navy, he and his mother settled in metropolitan France. While studying in Paris, he discovered a true passion for philosophy, which he decided to make his profession—he enrolled at the École Normale Supérieure, at the time part of the University of Paris. From June 1943 he was fully engaged with the French Resistance, joining the maquis of the Haut Jura under the code name of Kant. Pertusi was born in Piacenza from Ugo and Giovanna Pertusi (née Bossoli). His early interest in literature and art was influenced by his family environment — for example, his maternal grandfather, Gaetano, was a violinist who played with Giuseppe Verdi. The Pertusis moved to Milan in 1921. Here he attended the Barnabite Liceo classico "San Zaccaria" (1932–1937) and later enrolled at the Università Cattolica (1937–1941). A student of Raffaele Cantarella, he graduated submitting a dissertation in Byzantine studies. He served in the Royal Italian Army from 1941 until the fall of the Fascist regime (25 July 1943), which saved him from being drafted and serving on the Eastern Front. 8f3784307d She was a visiting professor at the University of Pennsylvania, the University of Buenos Aires and the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. 8f3784307d The distinctive character of the Sardinian language among the Romance languages has long been known among linguists. In his youth he was drawn to the Manichaean faith, and later to the Hellenistic philosophy of Neoplatonism. After his conversion to Christianity and baptism in 386 by Saint Ambrose, Augustine developed his own approach to philosophy and theology, making significant contributions in a wide variety of areas. He is known as Doctor Gratiae ("Doctor of Grace") for the vast influence of his views on the necessity of unmerited, prevenient grace, for salvation and the nature of original sin. After obtaining a teaching qualification in History of Philosophy, she became a full History of Medieval Philosophy professor at the University of Milan from 1980 to 2008. She was co-director of the History of Philosophy Series (Collana di Storia della Filosofia, FrancoAngeli, Milan)[1], co-director of Doctor Virtualis, an online and print journal of medieval philosophy, and a member of the scientific committee of the journal Nuova... Among the most famous buildings he designed are the churches of San Sebastiano (1460) and Sant'Andrea (1472), both in Mantua.

Leon Battista Alberti He is considered the founder of European cryptography, a claim he shares with Johannes Trithemius. Little is known about the life of Guccio di Mannaia, and very few works are attributed to him with certainty. He came from a family of Sienese goldsmiths, with his brother (Pino) as well as his three sons (Montigiano, Mannaia, and Jacopo) working in the same trade. He was influenced by Pace di Valentino who was the first Sienese goldsmith working for the papal court (under popes Nicholas III, Martin IV, Honorius IV, and Boniface VIII). In addition, he seems to have been familiar with northern European artworks, such as the Westminster retable in England and the miniatures in illuminated manuscripts of the Parisian Master Honoré, to which the human figures in his work are often compared. It is certain that he was actively working until 1322 though he was dead by 1329. Additionally, he made important contributions in ecclesiology, noting the validity of sacraments regardless of the merit of the celebrant against the views of the Donatists. In his book The City of God, Augustine imagined the Church as a spiritual City, distinct from... Following the end of the Roman Empire in Western Europe, Sardinia passed through periods of successive control by the Vandals, Byzantines, local Judicates, the Kingdom of Aragon, the Savoyard state, and finally Italy. These regimes varied in their usage of Sardinian as against other languages. For example, under the Judicates, Sardinian was used in administrative documents. Under Aragonese control, Catalan and Castilian became the island's prestige... She founded the Quodlibet series, which published seventeen volumes between 1986 and 2009 with the Bergamo-based publisher Lubrina. She co-directed the series together with medievalists Luca Bianchi and Massimo Parodi. Until December 2017, she was a member of the editorial board of the Journal of History of Philosophy (Rivista di Storia della Filosofia), founded by her mentor, Mario Dal Pra.
