The play contains adaptations of several classic Greek works: the slapstick comedy, *Clouds*, written by Aristophanes and first performed in 423 BCE; the dramatic monologue, *Apology*, written by Plato to record the defence speech Socrates gave at his trial; and Plato's *Crito* and *Phaedo*, two dialogues describing the events leading to Socrates' execution in 399 BCE

The form originated in ancient Greece, and was adopted by the Romans (called *mercuriae*), and revived at the Renaissance in the form of term figures and atlantes. Hermae were so called either because the head of Hermes was most common or from their etymological connection with the Greek word ἑρμαῖ (hérmata, meaning 'blocks of stone'), which originally had no reference to Hermes at all

In medieval Europe, like trial by combat, trial by ordeal, such as *cruentation*, was sometimes considered a "judgement of God" (Latin: *iudicium Dei*, Old English: *Godes dǽm*): a procedure based on the premise that God would help the innocent by performing a miracle on their behalf. The practice has much earlier roots, attested to as far back as the Code of Hammurabi and the Code of Ur-Nammu.

Socratic problem Early proposed. However, these sources contain contradictory details of his life, words, and beliefs when taken together. Anytus Anytus Anytus (; Ancient Greek: ἄνυτος, romanized: Ánytōs; probably before 451 – after 388 BCE), son of Anthemion of the deme Euonymon, was a politician in Classical Athens. He is best remembered as one of the prosecutors of the philosopher Socrates in 399 BCE; probably because of that role, Plato depicted Anytus as an interlocutor in the dialogue Meno. Anytus served as a general in the Peloponnesian War of 431 to 404 BCE, and later became a leading supporter of the democratic forces opposed to the Thirty Tyrants who ruled Athens from 404 to 403 BCE. The death sentence of Socrates was the legal consequence of asking politico-philosophic questions of his students, which resulted in the two accusations of moral corruption and

impiety. At trial, the majority of the dikasts (male-citizen jurors chosen by lot) voted to convict him of the two charges; then, consistent with common legal practice voted to determine his punishment and agreed to a sentence of death to be executed by Socrates's drinking a poisonous beverage... Specifically, the Apology of Socrates is a defence against the charges of "corrupting the youth" and "not believing in the gods in whom the city believes, but in other daimonia that are novel" to Athens (24b).

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
